The Rector's Report

Rejoice Now, Heavenly Hosts And Choirs Of Angels

I pray that you have been able to take time over these past several weeks for the observance of a holy Lent. The challenges and crises of this age seem to make our Lenten practices, prayers and readings more pertinent than ever. For me, the Litany of Penitence used for confession on Ash Wednesday rang true for our culture with more clarity than in past years: asking God's forgiveness for our self-indulgent appetites and ways, for our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and for our lack of concern for those who come after us. Accept our repentance, Lord.

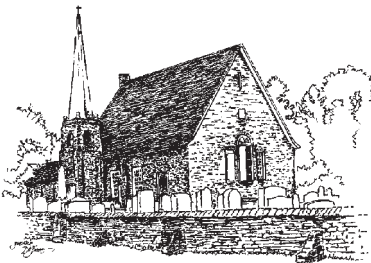
Next week we sing our Hosannas on Palm Sunday and begin the series of rich, timeless liturgies of Holy Week. Already the parish staff is busy planning logistics, preparing music and worship, and pouring over the many details of this most important week in the life of our parish family and the whole Church. As Episcopalians, we believe that our common prayer and worship is formative, that it helps shape us. Full participation in Holy Week on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter is truly transformative. Do we dare open ourself up this Holy Week to let God transform us for God's service?

We have been using a proper preface at Holy Communion throughout Lent that grabs my attention every time. In it we pray to God:

You bid your faithful people cleanse their hearts, and prepare with joy for the Paschal (Easter) feast; that, fervent in prayer and in works of mercy, and renewed by your Word and Sacraments, they may come to the fullness of grace which you have prepared for those who love you.

Fervent. Renewed. Fullness of Grace. It is not too late. Now is the time to prepare with joy for the Paschal feast. Already now is the time that we share in the eternal life secured for us by the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Christ overcame death and the grave, and hence we are raised to the life of God's kingdom.

One way in which I am preparing with joy for the Paschal feast is by working with the parish's new Director of Music, Craig Campbell, to better learn the Exsultet that I will sing in front of the Paschal Candle at the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. An ancient and extraordinary hymn of praise, the Exsultet celebrates important episodes of salvation history and is worth looking at on page 286 of The Book of Common Prayer. With Craig's coaching, and with God's mercy, I will sing:

Rejoice now, heavenly hosts and choirs of angels, and let your trumpets shout Salvation for the victory of our mighty King. Rejoice and sing now, all the round earth, bright with a glorious splendor, for darkness has been vanquished by our eternal King. Rejoice and be glad, Mother Church, and let your holy courts, in radiant light, resound with the praises of your people.

Rejoice and be glad, Christ is risen. Alleluia!

Choosing Easter

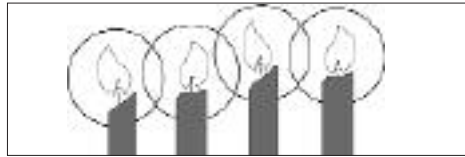
*"Welcome, happy morning!"
age to age shall say
(Hymnal 1982, #179).*

It is a strange scene that is described in the 24th chapter of Luke's gospel. Two men, disciples of Jesus, are walking down a dusty road outside Emmaus. They are dejected, "sadness written across their faces," in the language of Luke. The greatest event in their lives and in the life of the world has just occurred. Jesus Christ has risen from the dead. The first Easter has occurred. And yet the men are sad and downhearted. What gives? What is their problem? And how could their lives possibly not have been transformed by the news of Christ's resurrection?

The problem, of course, is that they just don't "buy it." Maybe they don't entirely trust the witnesses to the resurrection. Maybe they just can't deal with a concept too enormous as the possibility of Christ's actual rising from the dead. Or maybe it is something else, something more complicated. Maybe they just can't deal with the possible implications for their lives if this event is true: the challenge to leave their sadness and dejection behind, to live resurrected lives themselves, seeking and claiming the "abundant life" that their Lord promised them. Sometimes it is just easier to feel sad and dejected and go about business as usual.

What about us? Like those disciples on the road to Emmaus, we too have been told about Christ's resur-

rection. In fact we will celebrate it this April 12 -- Easter Sunday. We Christians proclaim ourselves "Easter people." But have we really "bought" the resurrection with all of its implications? Have we really *chosen* Easter? Or will we simply return to the "same old, same old" after April 12?



In order to keep the spirit and power of Christ's resurrection active in your own life after Easter, I invite you to ponder the following questions: Would more regular church attendance help you to continue to feel the power of Christ's presence? Would choosing a particular spiritual discipline -- and practicing it faithfully -- help you to keep the power of the living God alive in your heart? Would paying greater attention to the health of your body through diet and exercise help you to feel more alive and energetic, not only physically but also spiritually? Would working on a change of mental attitude, becoming aware of negative patterns of thinking and behavior and working to eradicate them, help you experience Easter in your heart? Would some form of dedicated service toward God's people help move you out of yourself and into a greater Christian concern for others?

Easter is an event. But it is also a choice. Are you ready to *choose* Easter this year?

Film Series Continues On April 11 & April 25

All Saints' & St. George's film series will continue Saturday, **April 11**, with the showing of Pier Paolo Pasolini's *The Gospel According to St. Matthew*. The film will be shown in St. George's parish hall **at 1 p.m.** on the Saturday immediately preceding Easter.

The film, which was nominated for three Academy Awards, was acclaimed at the time of its release in 1964 as one of the most moving and evocative cinematic accounts of the life of Christ. Roger Ebert, of the *Chicago Sun-Times* called it "one of the most effective films on a religious theme I have ever seen."

The series continues with *Inheriting the Trade*. An American family confronts its legacy of involvement in the 19th century slave trade. This film will be shown on Saturday, **April 25** at **1 p.m.** at St. George's parish hall.

The DeWolf family of Rhode Island is one of the oldest families of the state, as well as a distinguished name in the Episcopal Church, having produced many priests and bishops. At age 40 in 2001, Thomas DeWolf was astounded to discover that he was related to the most successful slave-trading family in American history, responsible for transporting at least 10,000 Africans to the Americas. When his ancestor, prominent slave-trader Sen. James DeWolf died in 1837, he was the second-richest man in America. This film ends our series on redemption.

Those who attend the film showing on April 25 are invited to bring with them their own favorite film for viewing sometime in May, on a date to be selected. The group will decide on the last movie this season. Showings may continue on an occasional basis in the future, depending upon continuing group interest. -- Fr. Chris Moore

Meditations

Read: John 20:1-18

John 20:15 “Woman,” he said, “why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?”

Thinking he was a gardner, she said, “Sir, If you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him.” NIV

What did Jesus look like? In this account, Mary did not recognize him after the resurrection. In the account of the disciples on the road to Emmaus, we find they did not recognize him as well. If He were to appear before us tomorrow, would we recognize him? Every portrayal I have ever seen is a man with a beard who was wearing a white robe. In every picture or icon I have seen this same image, and have formed a view of what he would look like. But then again maybe he would look like you or me or someone we have already met.

Once in a while, things happen to us that appear to be very strange. It can come, and usually does, when we least expect it. It could be a stranger we encounter or maybe an act by a stranger that we have never seen. I heard of an account of a lady driving across Alligator Alley in Florida in the dark of night. There were no other cars around or lights that she could see. One of her tires went flat and she began to get overcome by fear. As she looked up into her rear view mirror, a car was stopping right behind her. A man walked

up and asked for her keys to open the trunk. He changed the tire, gave her back her keys and was on his way. We probably would dismiss this as a man passing by, sizing up the situation quickly and doing a good deed. What we can't explain is where did he come from and who was such a man? If you don't want to believe it was Jesus, then you must admit he had to have the Spirit of God in him.

Recently I lost a set of car keys and they were returned to one of the three places I had been. I do not know exactly where they were found or who it was that found them. I only know that someone gave them to a clerk in the store. I was worried because I would have to get new keys and remotes for both cars as well as house keys. When people do the right thing, I believe that the Christ in them is working so that others may rejoice in the Glory of God.

Pray: Father of all creation and most merciful and just God, open my ears to hear and my eyes to see.

Help me to see your Son, Jesus Christ, in others that may come into my life known or unknown. Help me also that I may be the one who may bring your joy to another by what I do in my own life. This I ask in the name of Jesus Christ, your only Son, my Lord. Amen.

Craig Campbell Selected As Parish Music Director

Craig Campbell of Johnson City, Tenn., has been selected to become the All Saints' Church & St. George's Chapel new music director, following an exhaustive search by Alex Helsabeck plus reviews and auditions with our Search Committee.

Craig remembers falling in love with the piano when he was three. The keyboard was to become his life's calling. "I knew what I would do in life by the time I was 13," he continues. "It would be at the organ in church."

He says music is more of a vocation instead of a job. It's part of the spiritual journey people seek when they come to church.

He earned degrees from The Julliard School and Yale School of Music/The Institute of Sacred Music, studied under world renowned organist Daniel Roth and

has even played the organ at the legendary Saint-Sulpice, the second largest church in Paris.

"I took as many courses in theology at Yale as I did in music." He began playing at three, as soon as his grandmother bought him a piano. He began taking lessons at six. At 16, he played for the American Guild of Organists.

He received a master degree of music from Yale and served at churches in New Haven, Conn., Lake Charles, La., and Los Angeles.

He has accompanied the ETSU (East Tennessee State University) Chorale to the White House on several occasions for performances. While in Los Angeles, he accompanied a boys' choir to perform for Ronald Reagan after his presidency.

One of Craig's Julliard teachers said of him, "No exaggeration it is to say that he is among the brightest and best of musicians working in the American church today. Everything he attempts to do is done beautifully and to perfection."
