The Optimism of a Resurrection People

As we emerge from the travails of a snow laden winter and from the solemn Lenten season of self-examination and repentance, we are greeted with the new life of Easter. As I pause to write this at the rectory on a wet springtime morning, Olly's garden is alive already with flower buds and birdcalls.

Although we live in another turbulent time in history, an era of rapid change and complex challenges, our faith leads us to a sense of hopefulness and even serenity. We can be confident that God is making all things new, we can trust in God's grace. Salvation history described in The Bible from cover to cover reveals God's promise of new life, as does human experience. As exemplified in the resurrection of Jesus Christ on the first Easter, God does not let sin and death be victorious, but rather divine love and everlasting life.

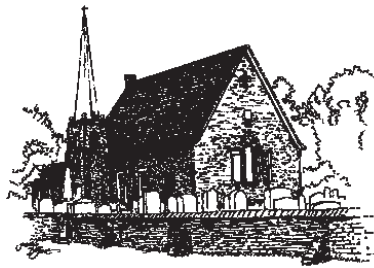
During the Thanksgiving over the Water at Holy Baptism (we have several coming up including five great-grandchildren of parishioner Lynn Jankus!), the priest says of the water of Baptism: "In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection." While enjoying a bit of college basketball's March Madness recently, I heard a woman coach describe her team as having a "collective optimism." As a people who

share in Christ's resurrection, and as a parish that strives to share God's love in the world, isn't this a fabulous description of us?

Our parish's Vestry gathered out at Camp Arrowhead on a sunny Saturday morning in March for a retreat day. After coffee and morning prayer, our Senior Warden Heidi Balliet read

from the parish profile compiled ten years ago. Parishes create a profile with information from a congregational survey before calling a new rector in order to discern the strengths, challenges and goals of the parish, and to better know what might be needed from new clergy leadership and staff.

It was quite moving to realize that our parish has accomplished together every one of the ambi-

tious goals expressed in that parish profile printed in 2000. These include the hopes of reaching out to more young families with children; to expand and strengthen Christian education and formation for all ages; to become a more welcoming and inclusive community; to increase the level of giving of money, time and talent; to fund and complete building projects at both churches; and for our two congregations to better honor each other and serve God together in harmony.

We have been able to accomplish these goals and more by the grace of God and because of our collective optimism. We trust in God who leads the people out of bondage and who raised Jesus from the dead. Through our humble efforts, God's love is truly more widely known in the community and the world (our Mission Statement.)

Of course our work is not done. Many of the goals expressed in the ten-year-old parish profile still apply. A new Vestry subcommittee has been convened to prayerfully consider what goals God is calling us to pursue now. I am confident that because we share the collective optimism of a Resurrection people, extraordinary things are possible.

CHRIS'S CORNER

Darkness Before the Dawn

"It was now about the sixth Hour and there was darkness over the whole land" --Luke 23:44

I don't know whether it is actually darkest before the dawn or if that is an old wives' tale. I do know that, as one who sometimes doesn't sleep well (one of the joys of being a "senior") I am occasionally up around four or five in the morning, and it does seem very dark just before the dawn. In any case, the phrase, "darkest before the dawn," is usually used to signify times in life when things seem darkest, often just before a bad situation begins to resolve.

Good Friday, which Christians will observe this year on April 2, is a "darkest-before-the-dawn" time. This day, which Christians call Good Friday ("good" because Christ secured our salvation on this day), could equally well be called Dark Friday. It is as if all the dark forces of the universe were arrayed in opposition to our Lord on that day: the corruption of the Jewish temple hierarchy, the brutality of Roman imperial power, dark human emotions of hate, fear, anger and opposition to the good. Indeed, the Gospels tell us that "Dark Friday" was *literally* dark: all three synoptics remark that there was darkness over the whole land during the three hours that Christ was on the cross.

But, as we know, that was not the end of the story. After the events of Good Friday, the world appeared to go into a kind of suspended anima-

tion for the next thirty-six hours, until early dawn on Easter Sunday morning. And then, with the first light breaking, women's footsteps are heard on the path, an empty tomb is discovered, and the world is never the same.

As I reflect on the events of Good Friday, I think of times in my own life that seemed dark. Often the reason for this seeming darkness was simply that I was in a period of transition and new directions had not yet become evident.

As I think back, I realize how often the darkest of the darkness that I experienced really did seem to occur immediately before the particular conflict or situation began to resolve. The resolution may have appeared in the form of a new person entering my life, a transformative sense of direction, a renewing of spirituality or the sudden and unexpected removal of obstacles which had seemed insurmountable. One moment it was dark. The next moment light was breaking. God's transformation was occurring. Good Friday was becoming Easter.

Have you tried to walk humbly with God? I remember when I was young and asked as a lay reader to go with an associate to a local nursing home to lead a worship service. We talked it over a bit and thought this would be easy. We must have asked God to wait outside while we got the job done. As we entered the strong odor of urine repulsed us. The nurse cautioned us to not get too close to the man in the wheel chair as he liked to reach out and strike someone occasionally. Then we arrived in a large living room. Some of the residents had already been placed in the room. Some appeared to be asleep and others groaned as if in pain. More were wheeled in chairs and some were tied so they would not fall out.

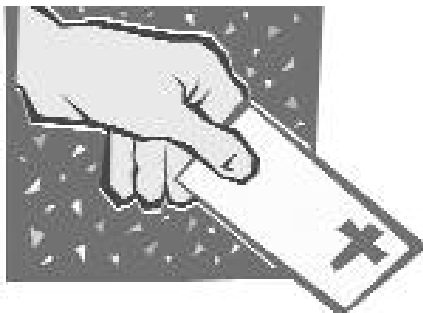
We looked at each other and all we wanted to do was get out. We opened with a quick prayer, did a brief reading, sung a quick verse of "Jesus Loves Me" and made our exit. As we left and found ourselves outside, I looked up and there was God with a big grin on his face. He didn't have to say one word. I was struck to the quick with how little compassion I had and how bad my behavior was. What kind of picture had I left behind?

Fortunately God is understanding and teaches us the right way when we allow him. Another opportunity came our way the following month. This time I had learned my lesson. I

told God if this is what he wanted then he needed to lead the way. Upon entering there was calm and no odor entered my nose or my thoughts. We opened with prayer and read from the Old Testament, Psalms and the New Testament. We talked about the meaning of the readings to us on that day. We sang a few hymns and then walked around the room and spoke to each of the residents. Many of them were able to thank us and some just squeezed our hand. As we were making our way out I stopped and spoke to the man in the wheel chair and found him to be quite pleasant. What a difference when we can be humble and let God lead the way.

*Pray: Father God, creator of all that is, most just and most merciful. Help me to walk humbly with you that I not be proud or boastful of myself. Take my hand and lead me in your footsteps that I might be a faithful servant and walk without fear. In the name of Jesus, my Lord and Saviour, I pray.
