The Rector's Report

June, 2010

O Spirit of Life, O Spirit of God

From now until Advent at the end of November the Church celebrates the season after Pentecost. Liturgically with appropriate readings, hymns and traditional symbolism we have progressed through the Church year as pilgrims following in the footsteps of Christ. Together we have experienced the anticipation of Advent; the joy of God's presence at Christmas; and the example of Christ's life, the sorrow of his suffering and death, and share in the new life of his resurrection during Lent, Holy Week and Easter.

After such a flurry of feast days and special observances, we now settle into the twenty-six weeks after Pentecost. In past years parishioners have commented that it seems like a rather long period of time every year to refer to Pentecost, that it appears unimaginative. Especially after the other Church seasons flying by so quickly, now we seem stuck. But it is good that we linger now and consider God's Holy Spirit active in our world and active in our lives.

The red clothing worn to church services on the fourth Sunday of May was not worn in solidarity with the Phillies or Red Sox, but to celebrate the fire of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost.

After his resurrection and before his ascension into heaven, Jesus promised that during Jesus' physical absence God would not leave us orphaned but would send God's

Holy Spirit to guide us into all truth. For two-thousand years now, the Church as experienced the Holy Spirit made manifest as the inspiration, wisdom, power, energy and exhilaration of God.

How do you experience the Spirit of God in your life? For many, the Holy Spirit comforts us with a sense of God's abiding pres-

ence, trusting that we are not abandoned, that we do not walk alone. Others find courage as a gift of the Holy Spirit to attempt tasks in service to God and God's people that they would have never believed possible.

I sense the Spirit of God acting in us and through us to help reconcile the world to God, breaking down barriers within our community, healing divisions and past

hurts. The politics of our culture can still be polarizing certainly, but I also witness a growing mutual respect and even affection across the divides.

I trust the Spirit of Life, present at the beginning of Creation, to be continuously active in renewing Creation. This trust creates in me a sense of optimism that God will give us the wisdom to address even the horrific ecological disasters that we have seen unfold in recent times. When it comes to the environment, it is not all downhill from here (which would be easy to assume.) Rather, our faith reveals that through the power of the Holy Spirit, God is making all things new.

Scripture and the experiences of endless generations confirm the abundance of God's Spirit poured out for all as a gift. Although many are insensitive to the activity of the Spirit, others of us glimpse that activity enough that we are transformed and empowered. I invite you during this long season after Pentecost to become evermore open to the Spirit of Life, the Spirit of God bringing you comfort, courage and wisdom to do God's will, that in going forth together into the world rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit.

CHRIS'S CORNER

Life Stages and Faith: How Spirituality Changes as We Get Older

Probably all of us remember that prayer we may have said as kids: "Now I lay me down to sleep/I pray the Lord my soul to keep ..." The four-year-old who prayed that prayer had a certain "faith" geared to a four-year-old level.

At Confirmation we began to see things differently, still again at mid-life, still again in our senior years. The fact is, what we call faith, or belief or spirituality, is constantly growing, changing and evolving. Even what may appear to be doubts may in fact simply be an indication that our faith is growing toward new understandings.

Our adult summer course this year is entitled, "Life Stages and Faith: How Spirituality Changes as We Get Older." We will be looking at the various stages of life: youth and adolescence, young adulthood, mid-life, the senior years and how our understanding of God, of ourselves and of the human condition, changes during those times. We will also be looking at the psychological changes during those periods, since psychology and religion cannot easily be separated. We will be regarding these changes as normal and also necessary, and as leading us to deeper faith and greater psychological maturity.

The course will meet at All Saints' five Wednesdays during the summer, from **July 7 to August 4**. Class sessions will be from 5:30 to 7:00 pm. As always, there will be opportunities for discussion and for questions and answers, as well as for group

presentations. Throughout, the emphasis will be on our life, our growth to spiritual and psychological maturity, guided by the Holy Spirit as well as own deep yearnings. We will be asking, how is God leading me through this particular stage? What lessons am I supposed to be learning? How are the outward circumstances of my life interfacing with my spirituality? If I am experiencing doubt, is this really "doubt" or instead growth toward a new level of understanding? And perhaps most important -- how can my problems, my crises and even the disasters of my life, be means to new growth and understanding?

The fact is, God continually gives us opportunities for growth throughout our lives. Adolescence is one of those times, although our relative immaturity during that period often makes it difficult to understand the "lessons" we are learning.

Midlife is another opportunity to "get it right," to make necessary changes in our lives, to reconnect with our life purpose and live more closely in accordance with the larger life that God wants to lead us into.

And then finally the senior years, starting with retirement and continuing into the years immediately following, can be still another time of refocusing, as well as of increasing wisdom, maturity and harmony with oneself and with others. James Hollis, author of *Finding Meaning in the Second Half of Life*, has written, "The recovery of personal authority is the central task of the second half of life. Namely, what is true for me, and do I have the courage to live that truth in the world? (The second half) is an invitation to a deepened conversation about the meaning of our own journeys." Join us on this exciting adventure into what it means to be you progressing through life, starting this coming July 7 at All Saints' Church.

Meditations

Read: 2 Cor 5-11-21

2Cor 5:17 Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come! NIV

When does this experience happen? When we are baptized we receive the Holy Spirit and are into the body of Christ and sealed as his own forever. When I was baptized as an infant I felt no physical or spiritual change but I know that I had the grace of God within me. I never felt alone or without love and only God could do that for me.

When I was a teenager in high school I decided to attend church and go to class to study the Catechism. Though I had been exposed to many different denominations and currently attending youth group at the Congregational Church, I chose to study in The Episcopal Church. I doubt that I gave thought that God may have been pushing me in that direction but as I look back I know God had his hand on me even then. At my confirmation the Bishop prayed for the Spirit to quicken within me; again, I felt no physical or spiritual change but God was not finished working in me.

It was much later in my life that I came face to face with Jesus and that is when my life changed. I can't say that this is the way it will happen for anyone but I know it happened to me. He confronted me about my life and what I was doing in the church. I did not feel any condemnation or threatened in any way. I knew I had to change but only He could do it for me. I was in my early forties when it happened and my life was completely changed. I could not get enough of Jesus and I read books

and bibles to learn and I prayed and talked with him.

This encounter made me new from the inside out and I was now alive. Some things He just told me and I could only think of the revelation He gave to Saul of Tarsus. I only know that once I was ready to surrender to Christ my whole life changed and I have never looked back. I believe it was like this for the Apostles at Pentecost when the Holy Spirit landed on them in the upper room.

Pray: Father God, Lord Jesus, Holy Spirit, stir in me your grace that I may be your faithful servant. Help to change from what I am today into that new creature you would have of me. Take charge of my life and let me walk with confidence that I may be your child forever. I ask this in the precious name of Jesus my Lord. Amen.

Note: The Ark Represents Latest Parish Fundraiser

By the time you read this, you will, hopefully, have noticed the addition of Arks to the walls of our parish halls.

The Ark represents our latest parish fundraiser on behalf of Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD). ERD provides animals to people in need, and trains them to raise, breed and care for those animals as a way of providing for their families and developing new sources of income for their communities.

Our Ark will include bees, chickens, cows, goats, pigs, ducks, geese, oxen and seedlings (which are also needed to sustain our ecosystems.) Our plan is this: We will take contributions through the fall of this year, in the hope that we can fill our Ark

with groups or pairs of animals and seedlings for a total of \$3,370.

Just place a contribution (cash or check) in the designated basket on the information table, with a note telling us what animal you would like to help purchase (checks should be made payable to All Saints' Church or St. George's Chapel with ERD Ark Project in the subject line.) You don't have to contribute the whole amount. Just write: \$5 toward bees or \$20 toward cows. The St. George's ECW started us off with the purchase of two pigs, and since then we have also received gifts of a goat and a tray of seedlings. Whatever you can give will help us reach our goal.

When enough money is raised to buy a particular animal or plant, the Sunday School children will color it, cut it out and add it to the Ark. When our Ark is full, we will write a check to ERD. If you would like to see a description of the animals we will purchase, please take one of the Gifts for Life catalogs from the information table, or visit the ERD website at www.er-d.org. As Episcopalians, ERD acts on our behalf to provide disaster relief and long-term development assistance to our brothers and sisters throughout the world. So far, we, as a Parish, have helped ERD build wells in Central America, and provide mosquito nets to sub-Saharan Africa.

The plants and animals from our Ark will not be targeted for a particular location, but will all go to the places where they will do the most good. Many of the people we help are living in extreme poverty (less than \$1 a day.) So, a flock of chickens or an oxen to pull a plow, can mean the difference between life and death. Please give as you are able, and pray for the recipients of our gifts and the work of ERD. -- Teri Smith-Jones, Outreach Committee

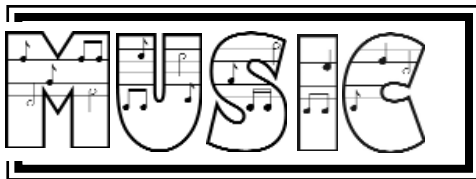
